In Memoriam THL Seamus Mac Neachtain

Lord Seamus Mac Neachtain was called Home on June 30, 2019. Seamus exemplified what The Dream means to all of us in the SCA. He was the epitome of what we strive to be: loyal, chivalrous, loving, caring, generous. We in the Society had his prowess and leadership for 18 years, during which time he garnered numerous awards, both on and off the field of battle. His colleagues remember him as larger than life, with huge bear hugs, a booming voice, and an imposing presence on the field. His friends remember him as a close comrade who loved to drink and tell stories. His family remembers him as a loving husband and amazing dad. His generosity was legendary, and he helped all those who he saw in need, be it with garb, gear, or support.

Seamus was Commander of the East Kingdom Southern Army, and was also a recipient of the Silver Tyger, as well as being inducted into the Order of the Tygers Combatant. His love and dedication for heavy combat fighting was something to which all fighters could aspire. To quote his Master of Arms and mentor, Ruslan Novgorodcev, "Mere words cannot even begin to express what Seamus meant for his family and for the 'family' of which we belong to. He gave so much of himself and the world and those he impacted are the better for it." His family and friends bid him farewell in a manner he would have appreciated: with song, stories, toasts, tears, and flames.

To me, Seamus was, and is, truly an angel. When he hugged you, it felt like he enfolded you with his great wings that provided comfort and strength. I deeply miss his generous soul and his friendship. In my role as Chronicler, I photographed him at SRWC, and he joked that he'd never get any coverage. I retorted that he would be featured in this issue of the Newsletter. I believe he knows that I kept my promise.

Newcomer's Corner: I Made A Thing! Documentation – A Beginner's Guide

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So, you want to enter Arts and Sciences (A&S) and you have decided to make a Thingy. Thingies come in lots of types, and shapes and sizes in the SCA, but yours will be uniquely yours. You'd like to enter your newly made Thingy in a competition you say?


Oh dear, they are asking you to document your Thingy! What is documentation you ask? Well let's go over a quick and easy list of things that make up good Thingy documentation. Let's get started.

- 1. Assume the person reading your documentation has no idea what it is that you have made. They are Thingy ignorant. You must teach them the wonders of your Thingy.
- 2. How did you get the idea to make your Thingy?
- 3. What museum, online source, book, or other place did you see a representation of your thingy?
- 4. Did you find a painting, illumination, illustration, whole Thingy or piece of Thingy in a museum to look at in order to make your Thingy? (list all these sources and talk about them)
- 5. What time period is your Thingy from?
- 6. What culture/ people group/ country is your Thingy from?
- 7. What is your Thingy used for in its appropriate time period?
- 8. Who used your thingy and how? Does it take skill? Is it easy to do? Have you mastered wielding a Thingy?
- 9. What tools were used to make your Thingy by the people that originally made these Thingies waaaay back when Thingies were in original use?
- 10. What tools did YOU use to make your thingy?
- 11. If you used different tools to make your thingy, from the ones originally used to make in-period Thingies please discuss....
- 12. What were the materials used to make Thingies in period?
- 13. What materials did YOU use to make your Thingy?
- 14. If you used different materials to make YOUR Thingy, vs original period Thingies, please discuss...
- 15. Did someone else help you make your Thingy? (credit the work of others also researching Thingies and anyone who helped you directly to make your Thingy)
- 16. What did you enjoy about making your Thingy? Was it an easy process, or troublesome?
- 13. If you had to make another thingy would you do something different?
- 14. If you teach Thingy making classes, feel free to list that

These things are really just common sense and they cover the main points documentation should cover though you can expand and be specific. This is what any person whether a Laurel, or otherwise, is going to want to know about the Thingy you've entered into A&S. You can even use headers so they know what each paragraph or page is covering. That way they can find the answers to their questions as they read. Usually the way they judge will be on how clearly you explain the reasoning behind your Thingy. Now go make gloriously wonderful Thingies and enter them into A&S forthwith!

Important PS: If you have already made your Thingy, go ahead and write about it- but if you want to put the horse before the cart instead of vice versa, get all the stuff together to write about the Thingy, then make the thingy. A well-informed process is a good thing. It can affect the final Thingy product and make it even better.

Also, now is the time to organize your sources into a nice neat Bibliography. Go for it, it isn't just the icing on the cake, it is the cake. You're basing your whole Thingy on this stuff. Make sure people know exactly what it is and where you found it.

For her current project she is trying a new angle. The focus of her previous project was the visual representation of her learning process That display was both illuminating and inspiring! For this new project she wanted to show more of the material culture of the time period, and put the vessels in a tangible context. She says that researching and writing her documentation has been fun, too, in keeping with the theme of creating the feel of a specific time and place. As she prepares to set up this new display, we are all excited to see what she and her fellow Champions have been working diligently on, as well. It should be a great showing all around!
